Child and Family Wellbeing Division Solicitation Update



Predictors of Kindergarten Readiness

(From 2007, 2009, and 2015 Assessments)

Research shows that being ready for kindergarten is a key educational benchmark that leads to continued success in future years.

All children need the support of family, community, and systems to be ready for kindergarten.

These three solicitations address almost all the factors associated with increased school readiness.





San Francisco Family Resource Center Initiative: For over a decade, FRCs have demonstrated ability to build community and social connections; increase families' engagement in schools and communities; enhance parenting capacity and confidence; support parent/child nurturing and bonding; and link families to resources and services in times of crisis.

Entities will apply as either neighborhood-based or city-wide population and will respond to Four Service Categories:

- **Responsive Relationships:** Family members learn from one another and have nurturing, supportive relationships inside and outside family resource centers. Services reduce social isolation and increase social supports.
- **Parent Self-Efficacy:** Parents understand developmental milestones, believe they can influence their child's development, and use practices that promote milestone achievement. Services promote understanding of child development as well as supporting parental resilience.
- School Readiness and Success: Children enter kindergarten with the cognitive, social/emotional, and physical skills that support school success. Services include understanding about the social-emotional competence of children.
- Stress Mitigation: Parents/caregivers have the information, resources, and connections to peers and professionals to successfully raise their children in San Francisco. Services connect families to concrete supports in times of need.

Early Intervention and Specialized Services System of Care RFP is intended to form a consolidated Early Intervention service system from complementary parts that were more siloed in previous grant-making and to enhance service components for children with moderate to high risk for developmental delays.

Entities will apply in one or multiple Service Component Areas:

- Children with Special Health Care Needs and Early Intervention Family Resource Center (one provider)
- Centralized Access Point (one provider)
- **Developmental Play Groups** (multiple providers)
- Care Coordination (multiple providers)



Mental Health Consultation Initiative: services are focused on improving the capacities, skills and understanding of adults of themselves and thereby impacting children's social-emotional needs and development.

All entities will respond to three categories of services:

- Mental Health Consultation
- Early Intervention & Mental Health Treatment
- Systems Work





- Family Resource Center Initiative: \$17.8 million anticipated to fund 25 grants
- Family Resource Center Initiative Proposals Received: 35 proposals representing 24 neighborhoods and 11 city-wide populations
- Early Intervention and Specialized Services System of Care: \$2.7 million anticipated to fund 9-11 grants
- Early Intervention and Specialized Services System of Care Proposals Received: 18 proposals received
- Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation Initiative: \$5million anticipated to fund 4-6 grants
- Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation LOI's Received: 4 anticipated applicants





Anticipating Contract Approvals

- <u>Numbers</u>: Approximately 40 contracts
- <u>Approval Timeline:</u> April/May contract negotiations; May/June Commission Approval
- <u>Contract Approval Materials</u>: Lists of agencies and funding amounts accompanied by initiative descriptions, logic models, and performance metrics
- <u>New Contract Launch:</u> July 1st
