Erin: I'm with parents for public schools of San Francisco, and I am blind and partially deaf it is a role, a primary part of my role in my work, and my passion in my personal life is to advocate on behalf of people with disabilities. Especially for public education. So, I have trouble. I am not able to make it into the boardroom, transportation, finding the room, finding a seat, knowing where to face all. Every single little detail that people who are able, bodied take advantage of or take for granted is a detail I have to think through in advance and find assistance and navigate all of that before I can even have my voice heard. Even with a graduate degree, a masters. I want to speak up on behalf of parents, parents that can't make it. I would like to be able to do that from the comfort of my home, where I'm relaxed and not stressed, and can speak freely on behalf of people whose voices are not heard at the table. Thank you for listening.

Maria Luz Torre: I'm the organizer of parent voices and we love to see all our commissioners in person, all this stuff in person, and I'm sure you also love seeing us with our kids in person. However. There are a lot of barriers our first 2 speakers mentioned to attending in person and giving public testimony, and I know that it's tough for many of parents of young children to to come to an evening meeting without childcare. We really support continuing, allowing for remote public comment. We believe it is very important. We have shown that during the pandemic. Many of our parents were able to participate in public comment at budget hearings, because they can keep their testimony wherever they are. So please allow for the extension of remote public comment. Thank you very much

Alex Maykowski: Here's Alex Maykowski with San Francisco, early care and education advocacy, coalition. So, I would also like to comment in support of continuing remote public comment. Significant barriers already exist for our community educators, providers, caregivers, and parents to be able to participate and have their voices heard. Maria kind of mentioned this, but they're often unable to attend government meetings because they're working or taking care of children, and I'm sure I'm kind of preaching to the choir here. You all just made the commute. It's not easy. Now imagine doing that with children, even a higher difficulty level, so remote public comment is really the great equalizer. I think the benefits of continuing and keeping remote public comment far, far outweigh any potential negatives. And it's really integral in

keeping our democracy healthy and we need a way to keep our public officials educated as well as informed of on the thoughts of people they represent. I know full well what it is to be a single mother, and not really be able to go to these types of meetings in person but have a hell of a lot of lived experience to share. And so, I think that our parents can do that in a way. And that way is by using the tools around remote access. Thank you all for again, for what you're doing on behalf of over 36,000 members of parent to public schools. Thanks.

Melissa Stevens: My name is Melissa Stevens. I'm a member of Parent Voices. I'm also wanting to support remote public comment. There's a lot of barriers. One of the barriers is like the bus. It takes about 45 min. I live in North Beach, and with the rain taking the 30 Stockton and taking another bus towards like City Hall and different areas. It's really difficult. Also, like, you know, driving in the rain today. Especially, I have an autistic child, and it's just difficult. And so please, please, please if you can keep remote public comment that would be awesome. I have other friends, too, that would love to be in these meetings. But because of the barriers, you know, they're not able to do that. So yes, please keep remote public comment. Thank you so much.

Sarah Hicks-Kilday: I work with Early Care Educators in San Francisco and really want to advocate for continued open comment. I have been making calls just today, and even with the hard work we're doing. And I'm sure it's going to change. There still is a staffing shortage and very much both administrators and teachers at sites have trouble getting out to important policy decision making bodies such as this. And I think we are doing hard work to get people more informed, not less more participatory, and keeping open comment in meetings such as this is very important.

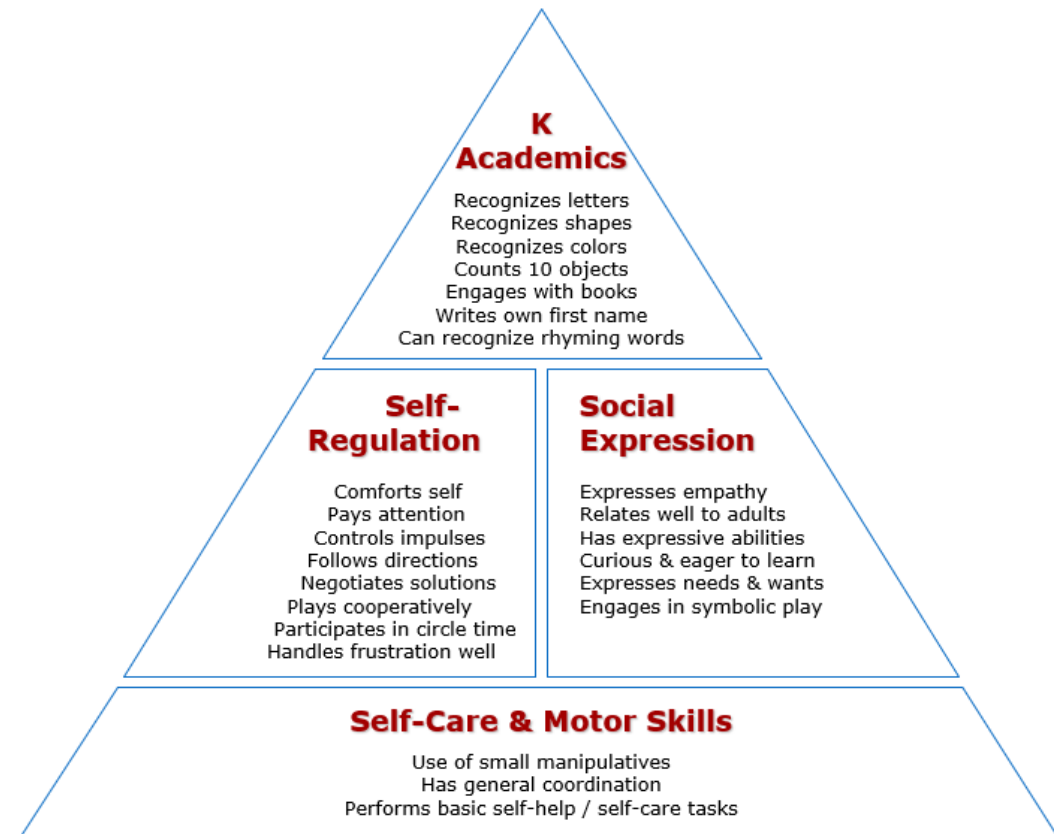

Longitudinal study background

- In 2022-23, DEC contracted with Clarity Social Research Group to conduct a retrospective longitudinal study of the relationship between kindergarten readiness and long-term school outcomes.
- Children entered kindergarten in 2009 and were given the Kindergarten Observation Form, an assessment organized around four basic “building blocks” of readiness.

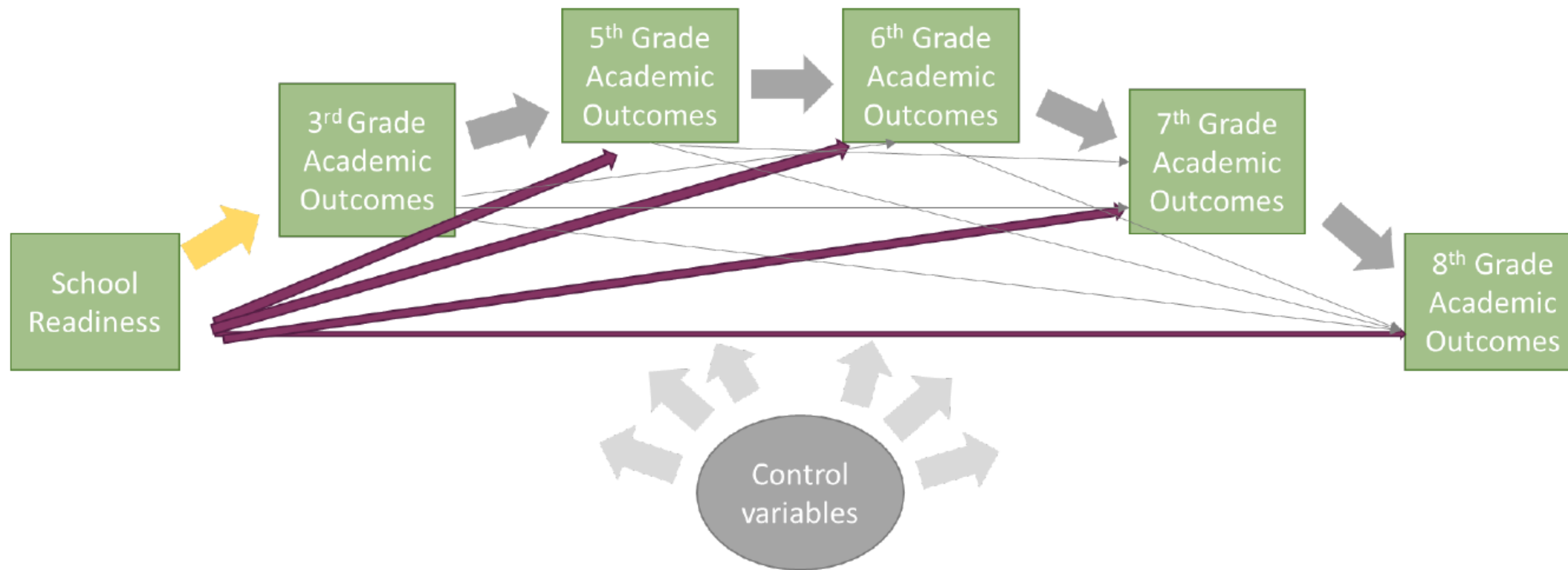

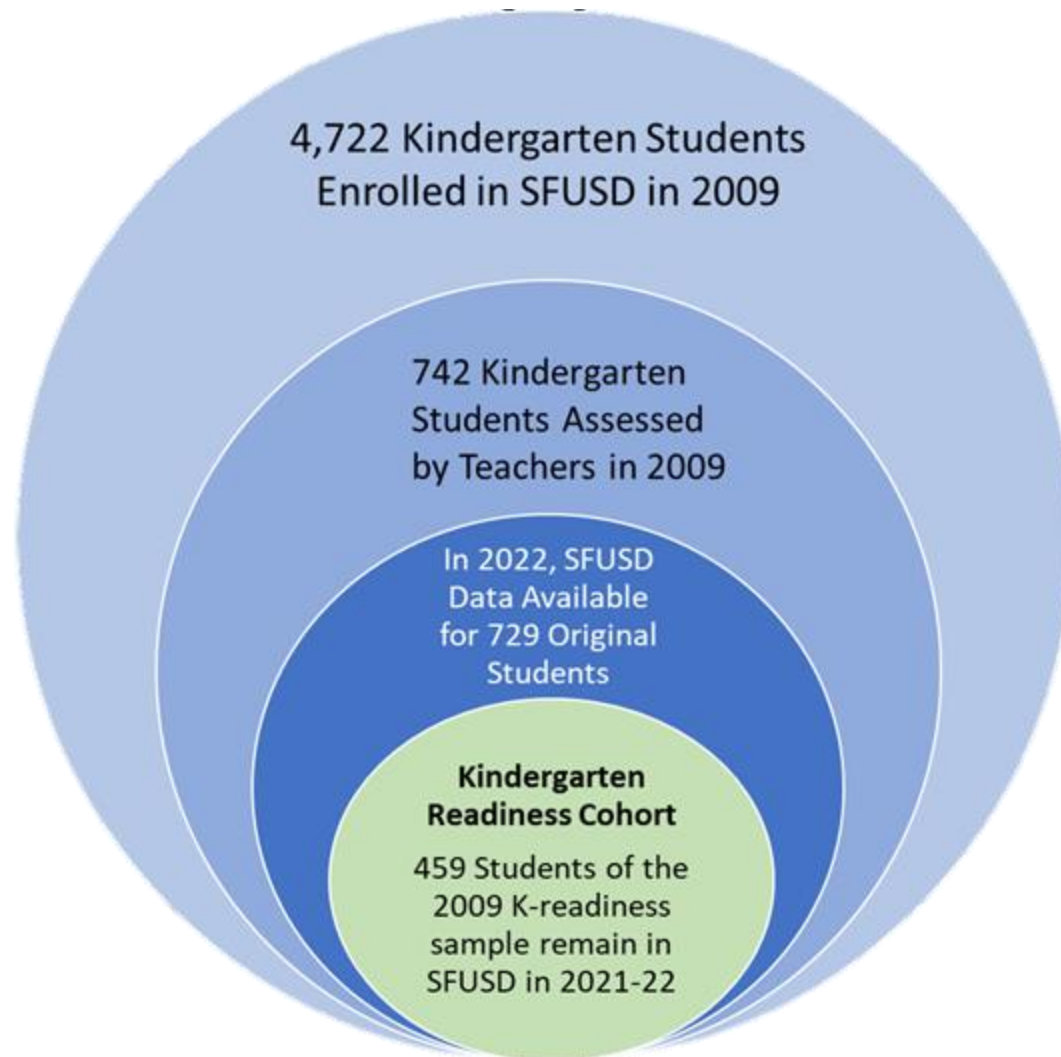

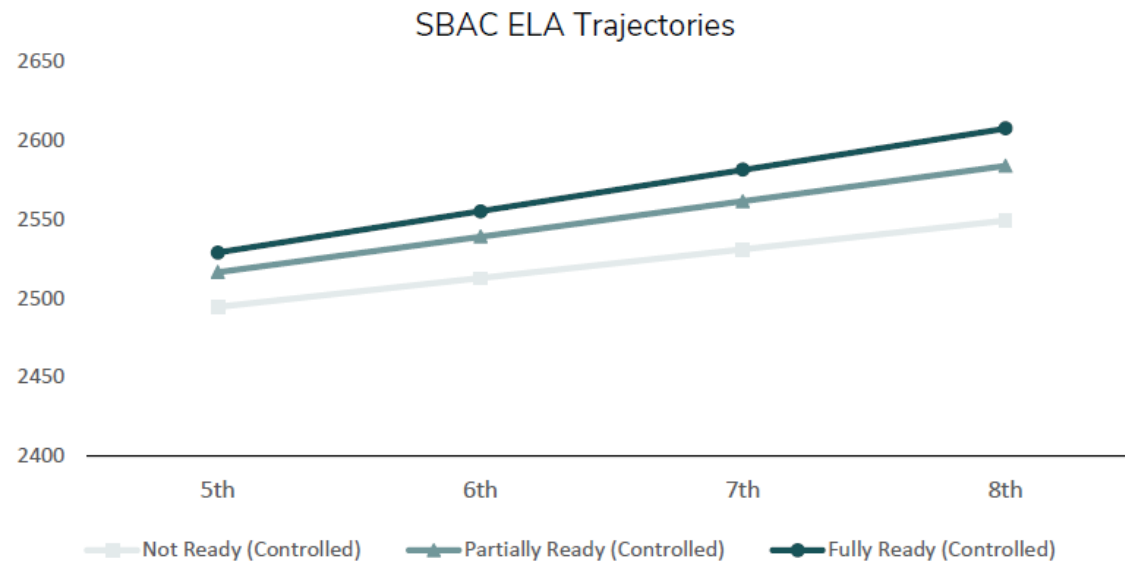


Impact of K readiness on academic success across grades

- K readiness is significantly associated with 3rd grade English language arts (ELA) scores and 3rd grade Math scores in Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) tests.
- Performance on ELA and Math tests in earlier grades predicts performance in later grades.
- K readiness exerts direct effects on 6th grade ELA scores and 5th, 6th, and 7th grade Math scores even after earlier scores were accounted for.
- K readiness was significantly associated with middle school grade point average (GPA), even after control variables were accounted for.
- Kindergarten Academics was a significant predictor for middle school GPA, whereas only Self-Regulation & Social Expression was a significant predictor for high school GPA.

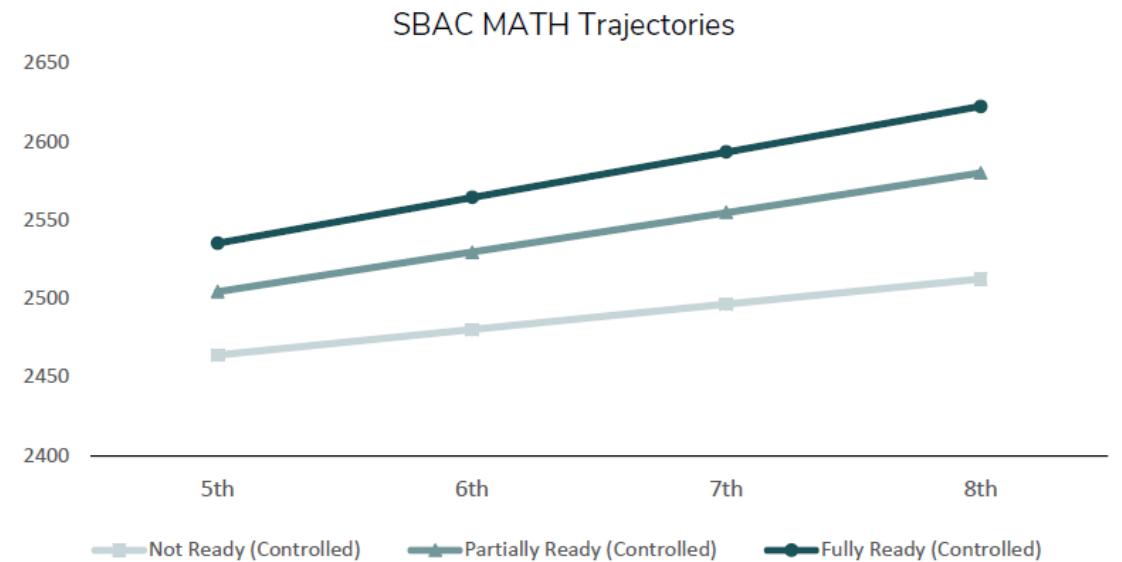

Figure 24. Percent Suspended by Readiness

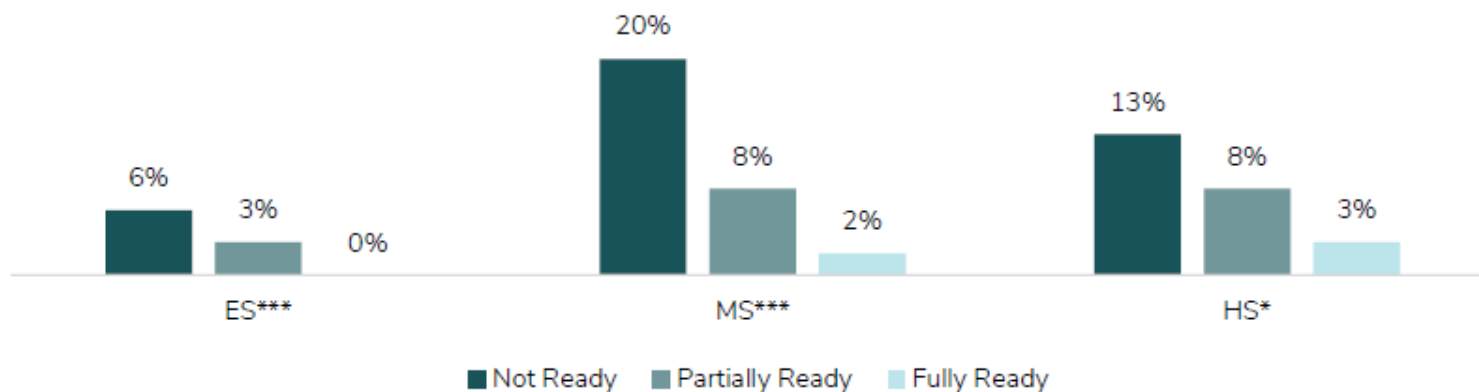
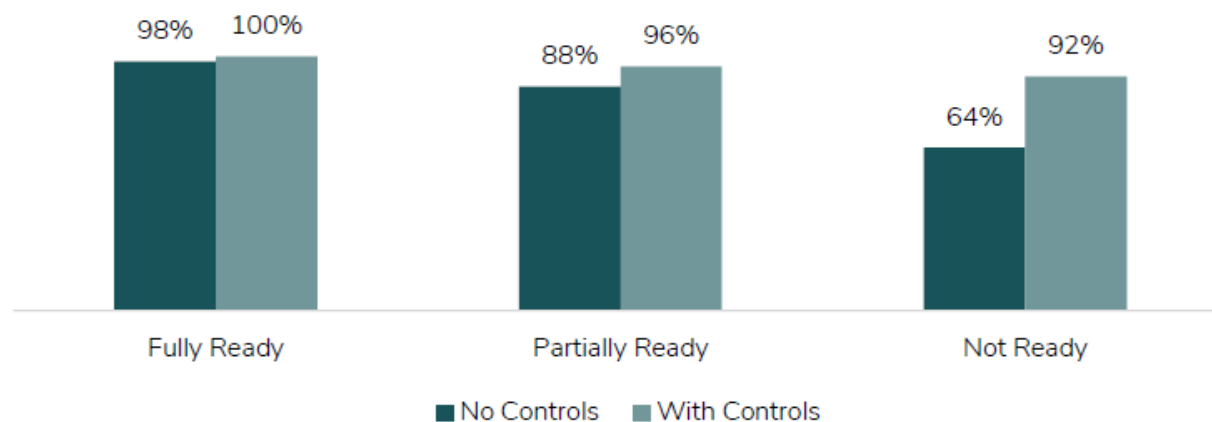
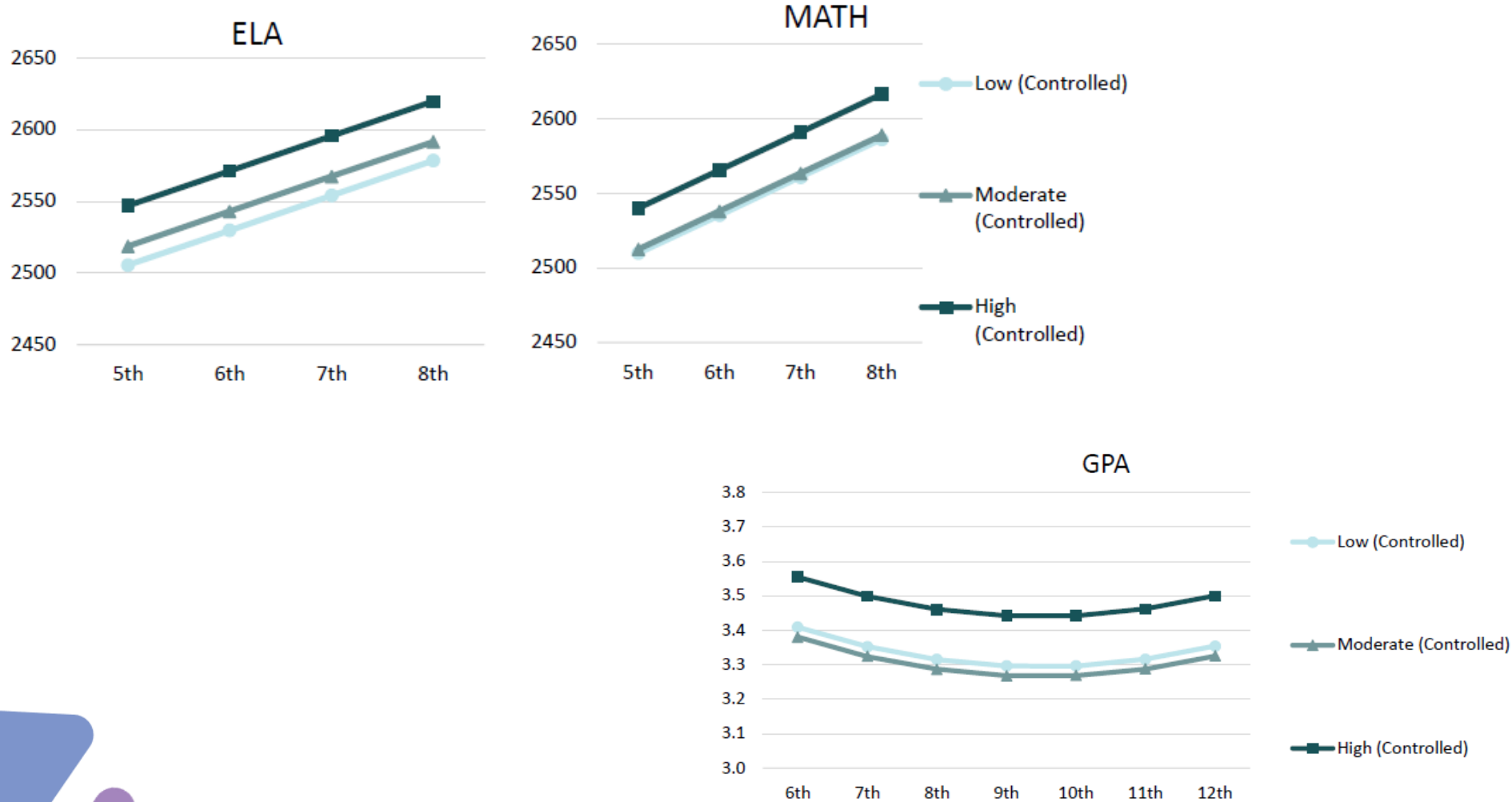


Figure 30. On-Time Graduation by Readiness Group

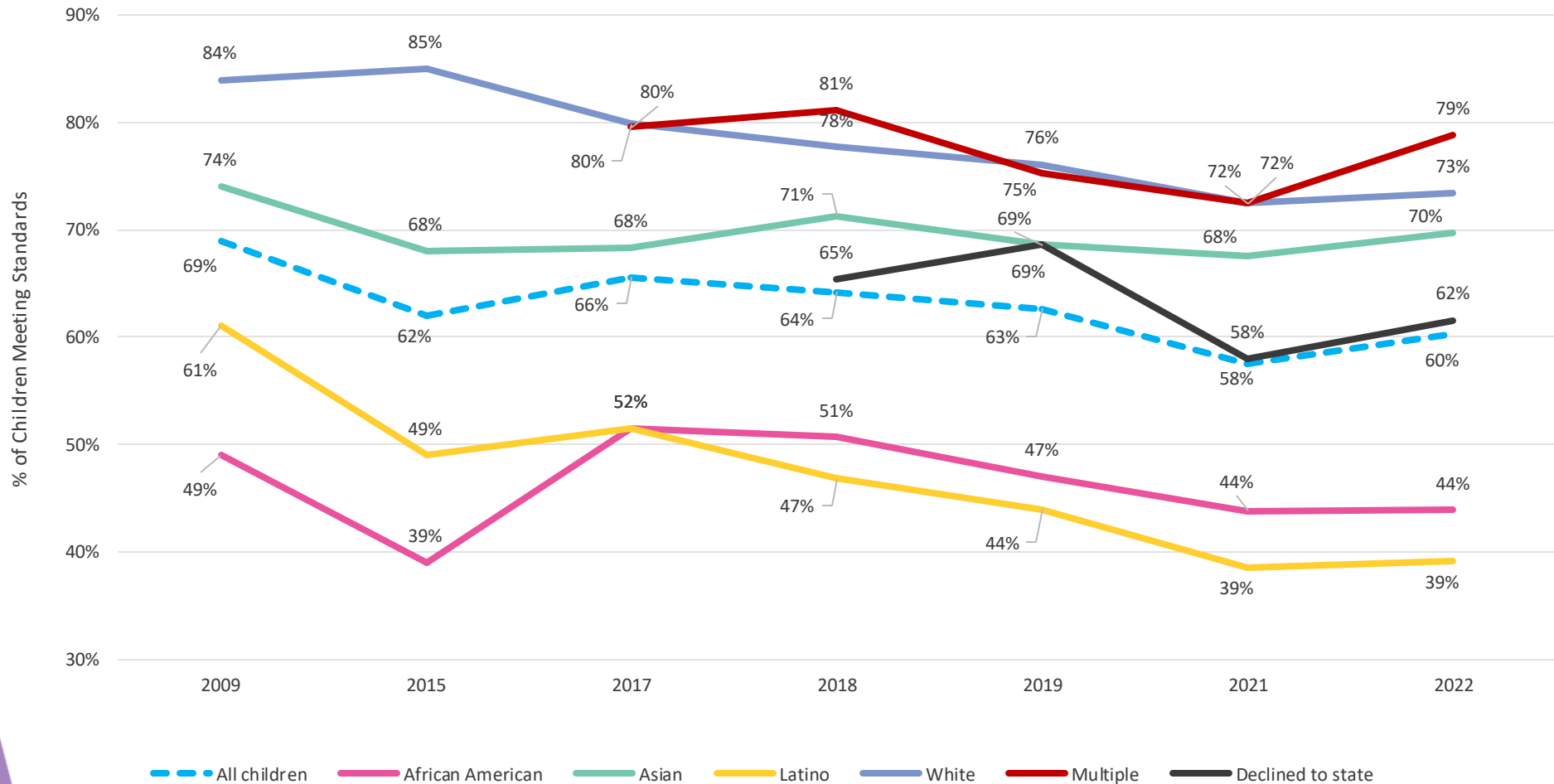

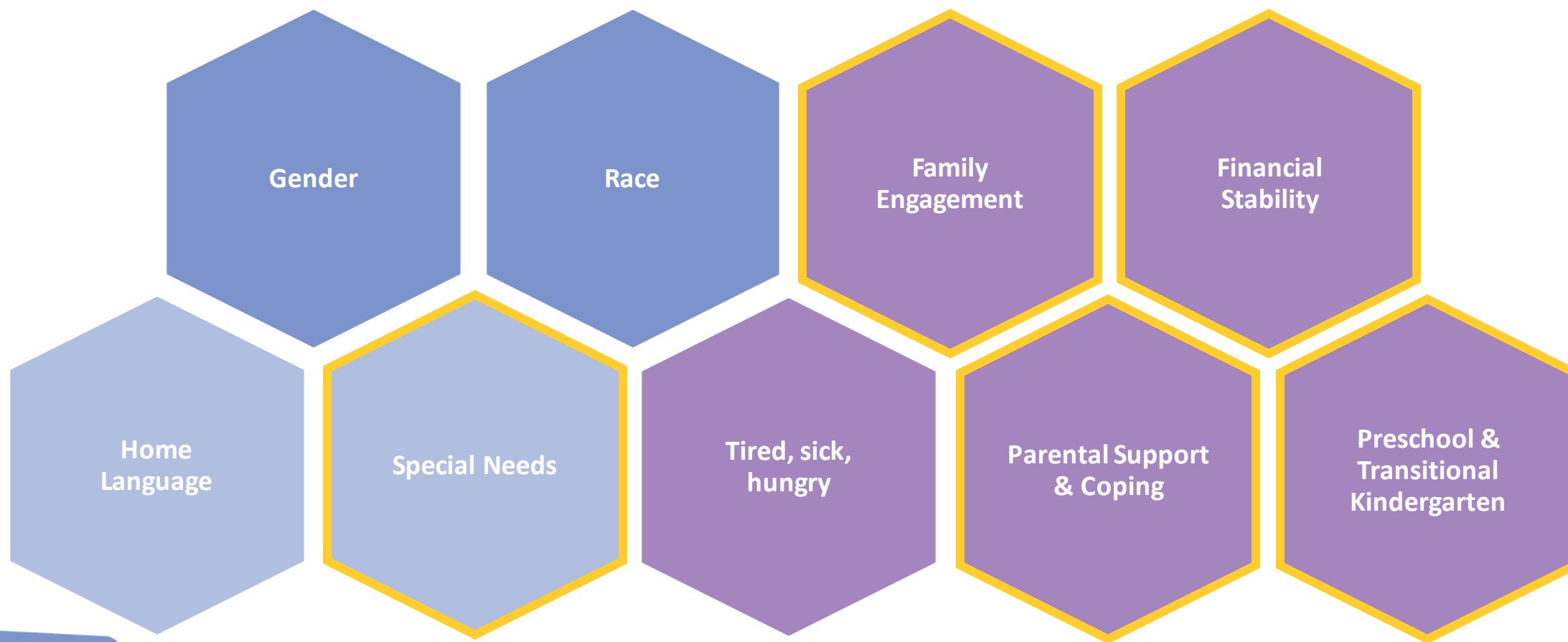

Factors Contributing to Readiness



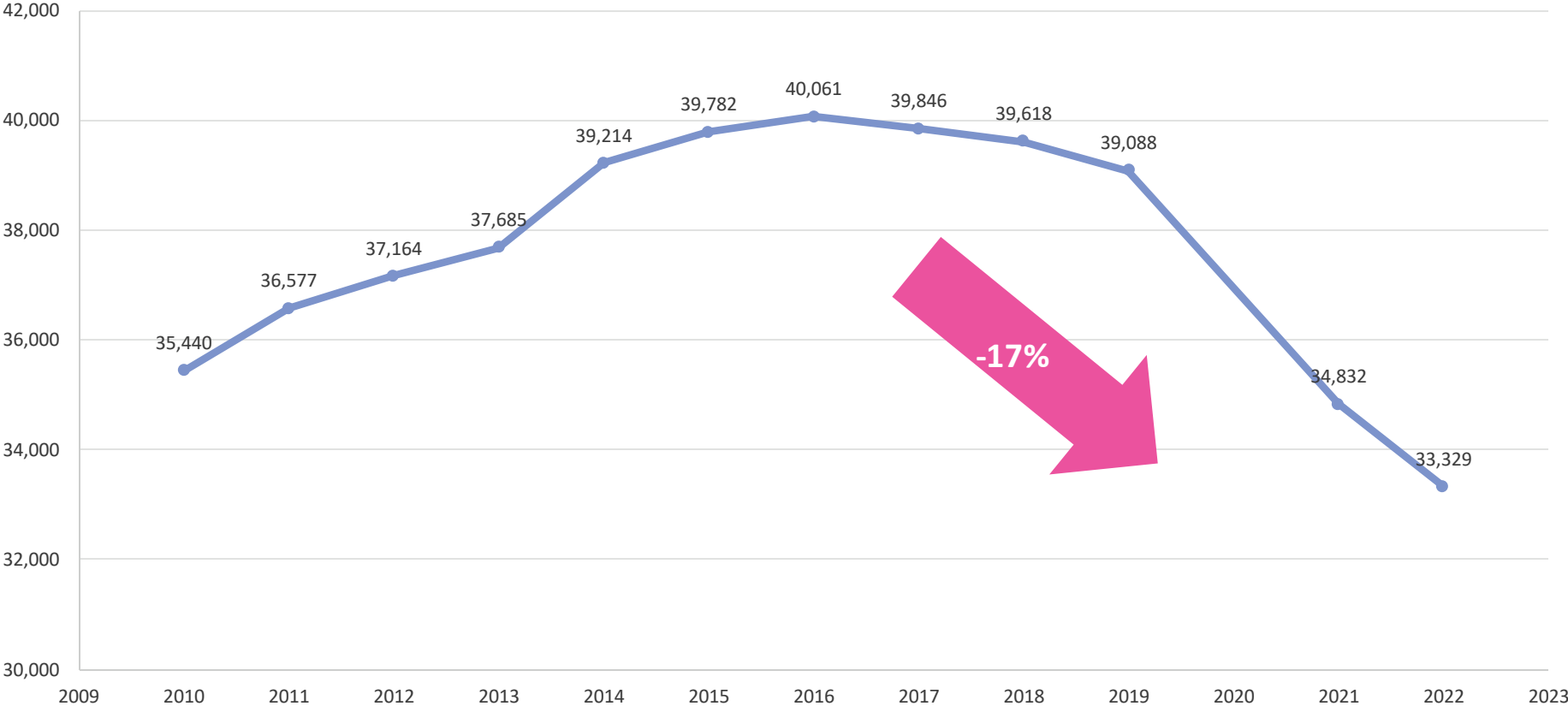

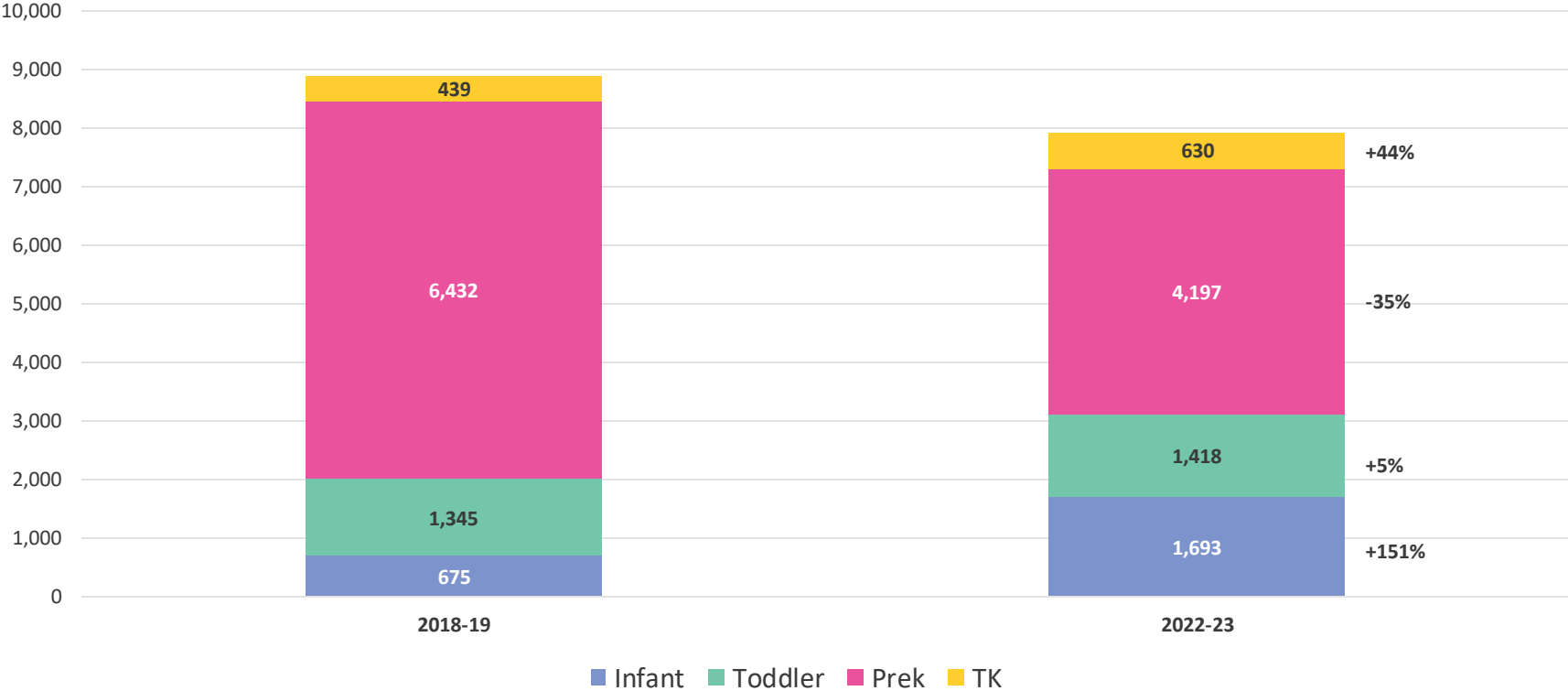
The 0-5 population has decreased in San Francisco

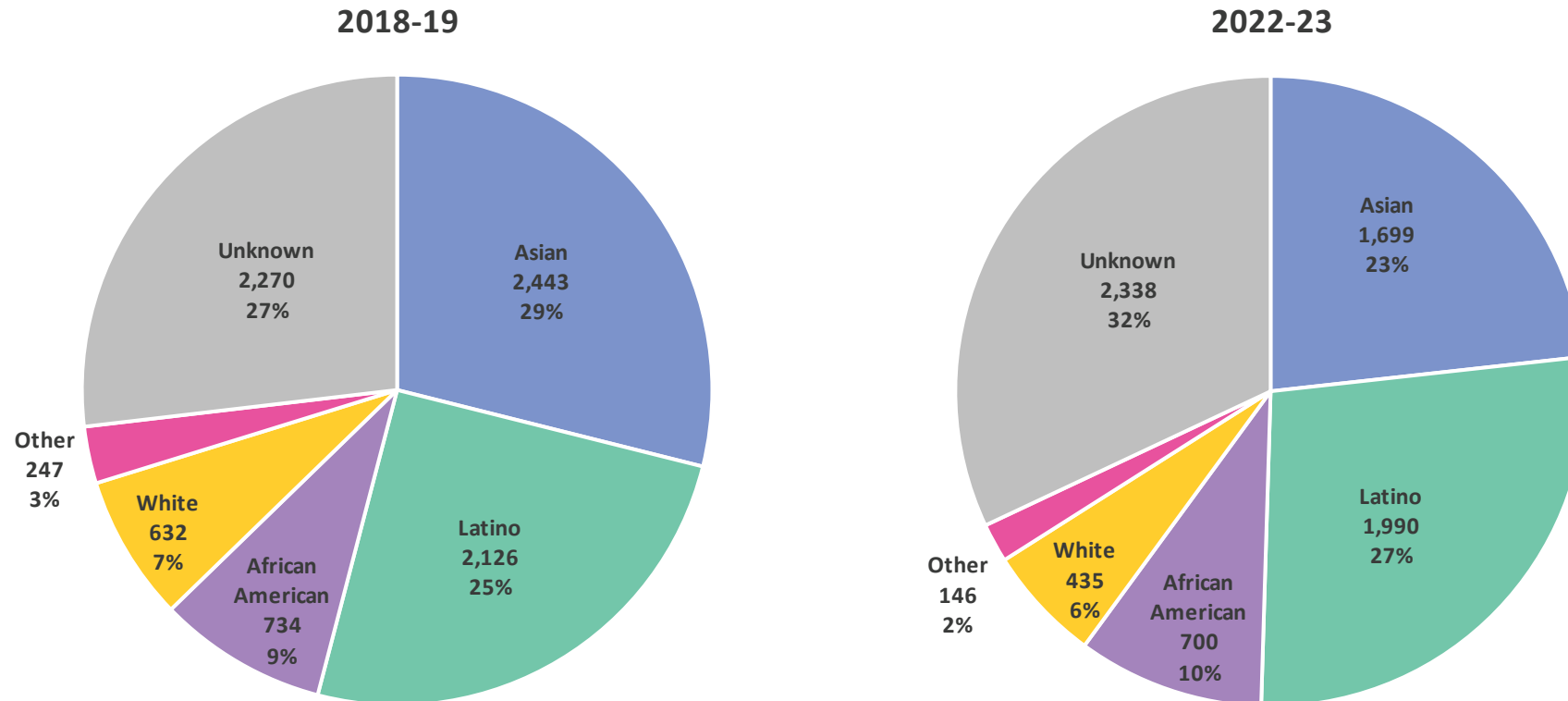

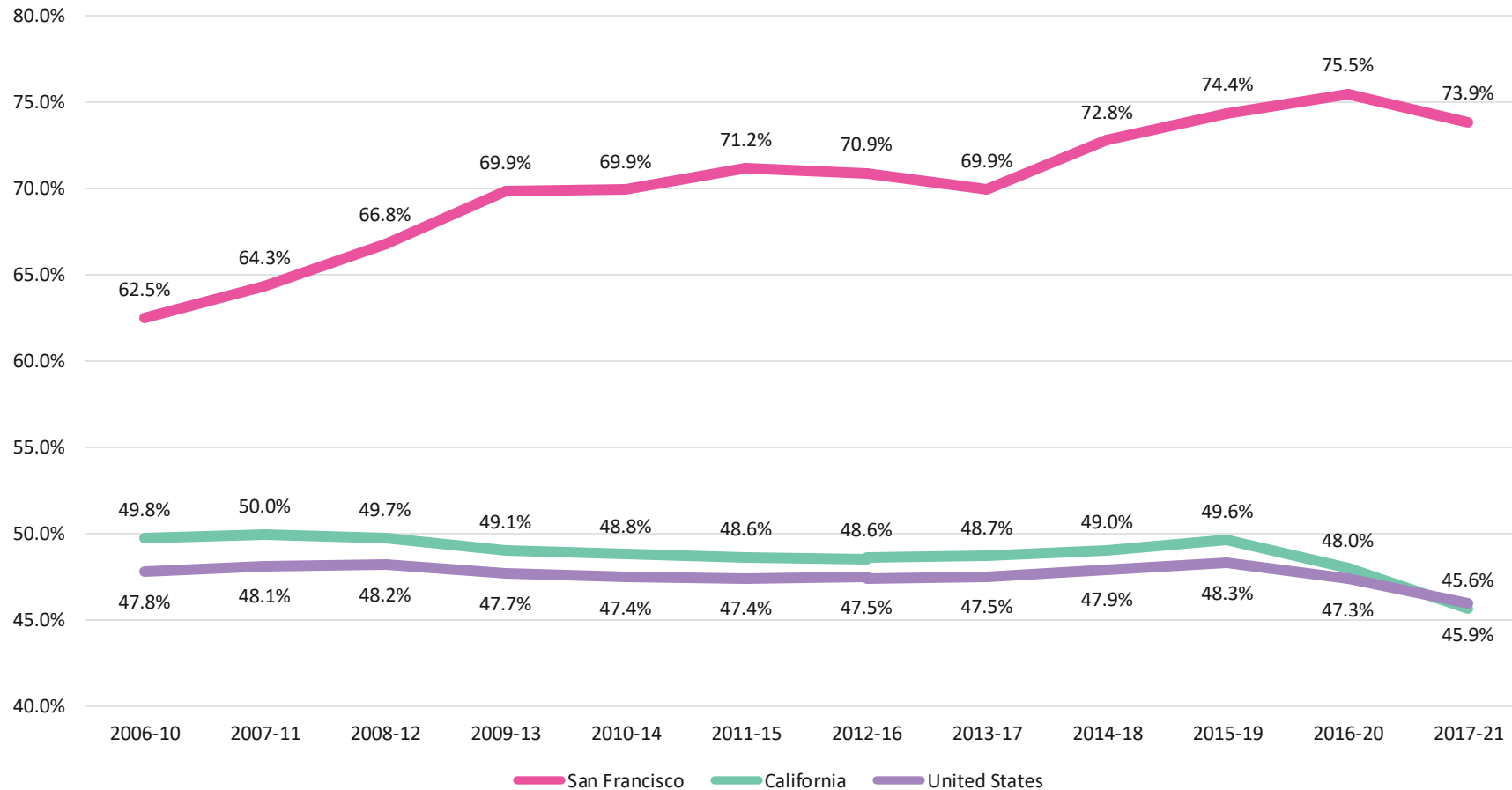
ELS enrollment mirrors demographic changes

ELS Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity

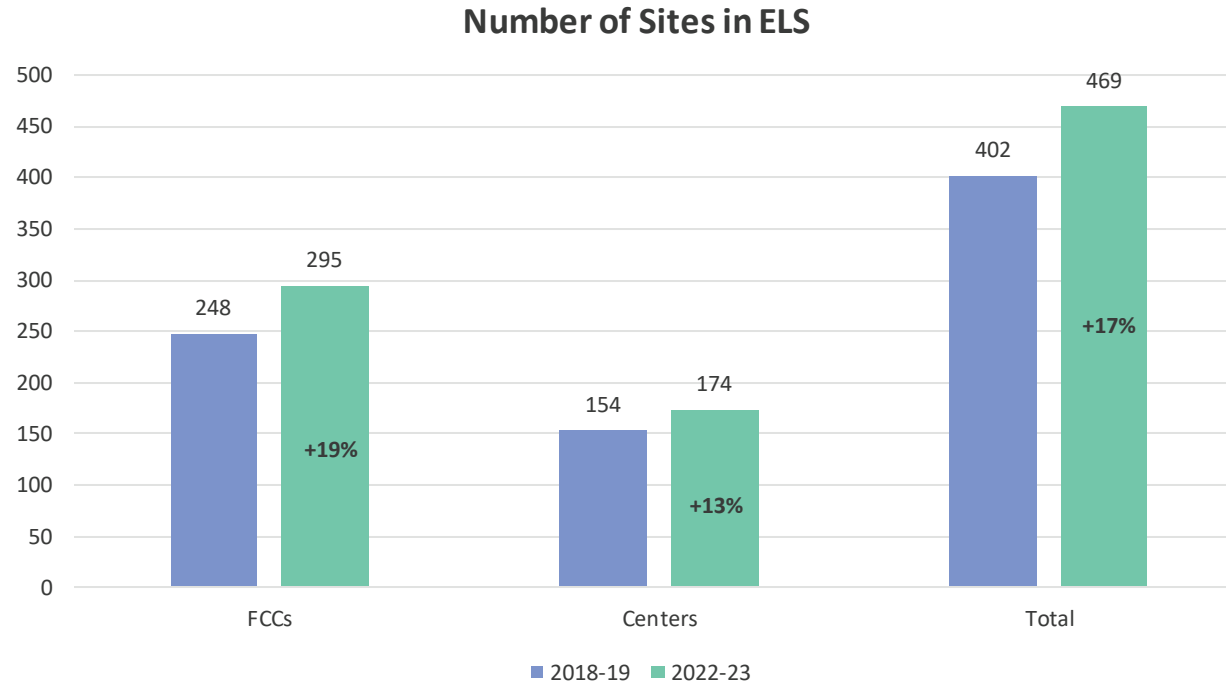


San Francisco still leads the nation in preschool enrollment

(American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates)



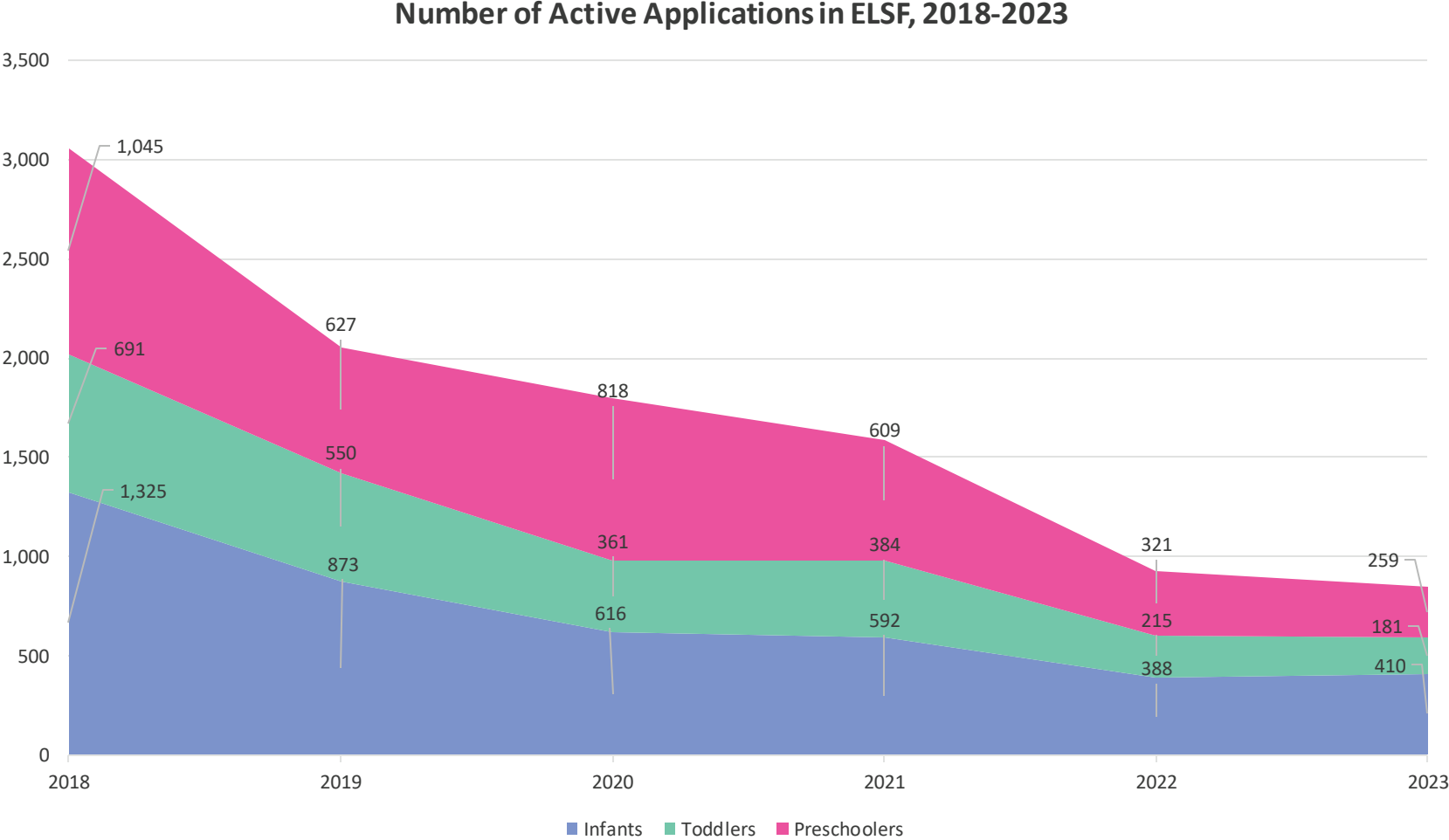

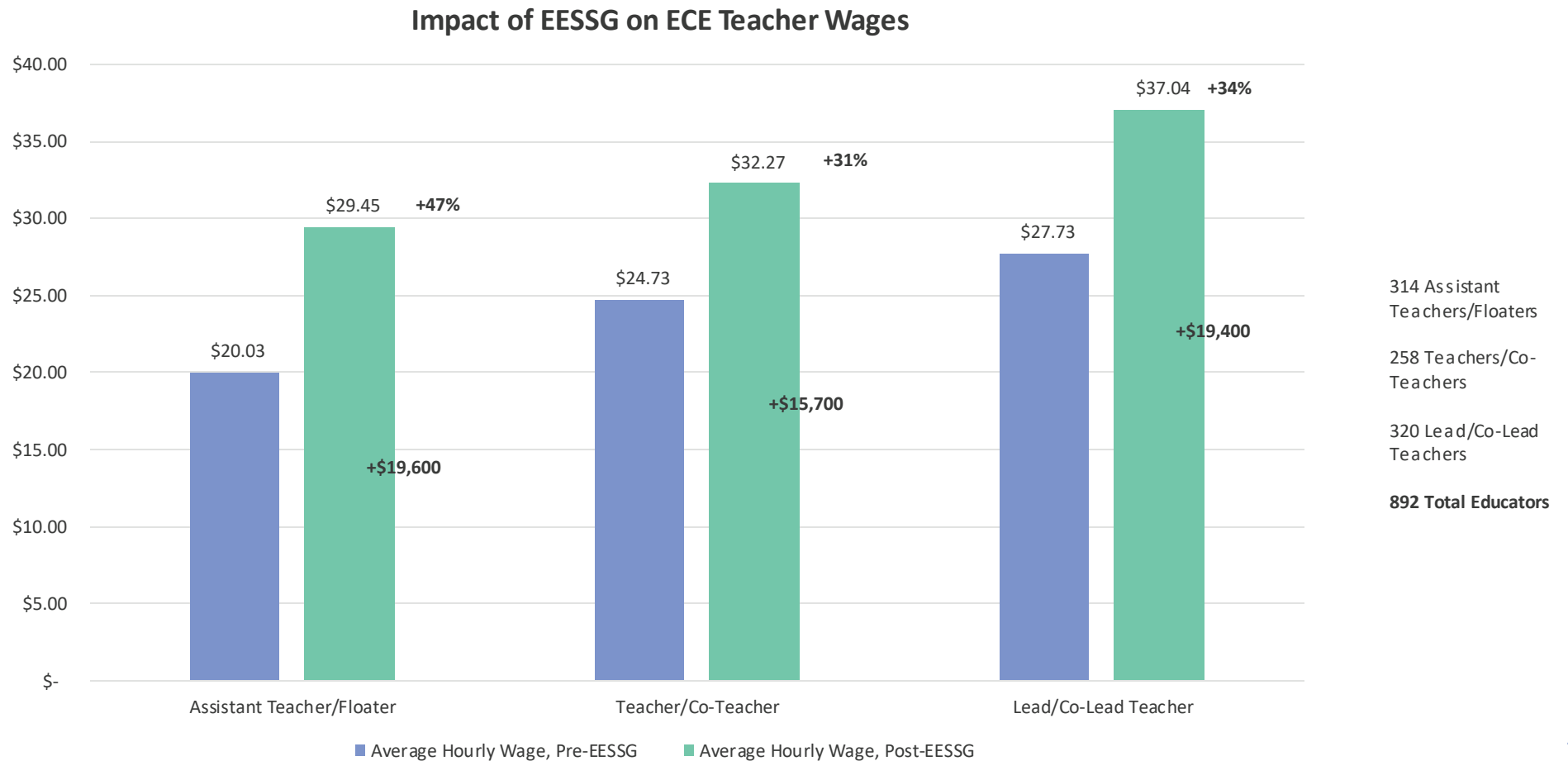

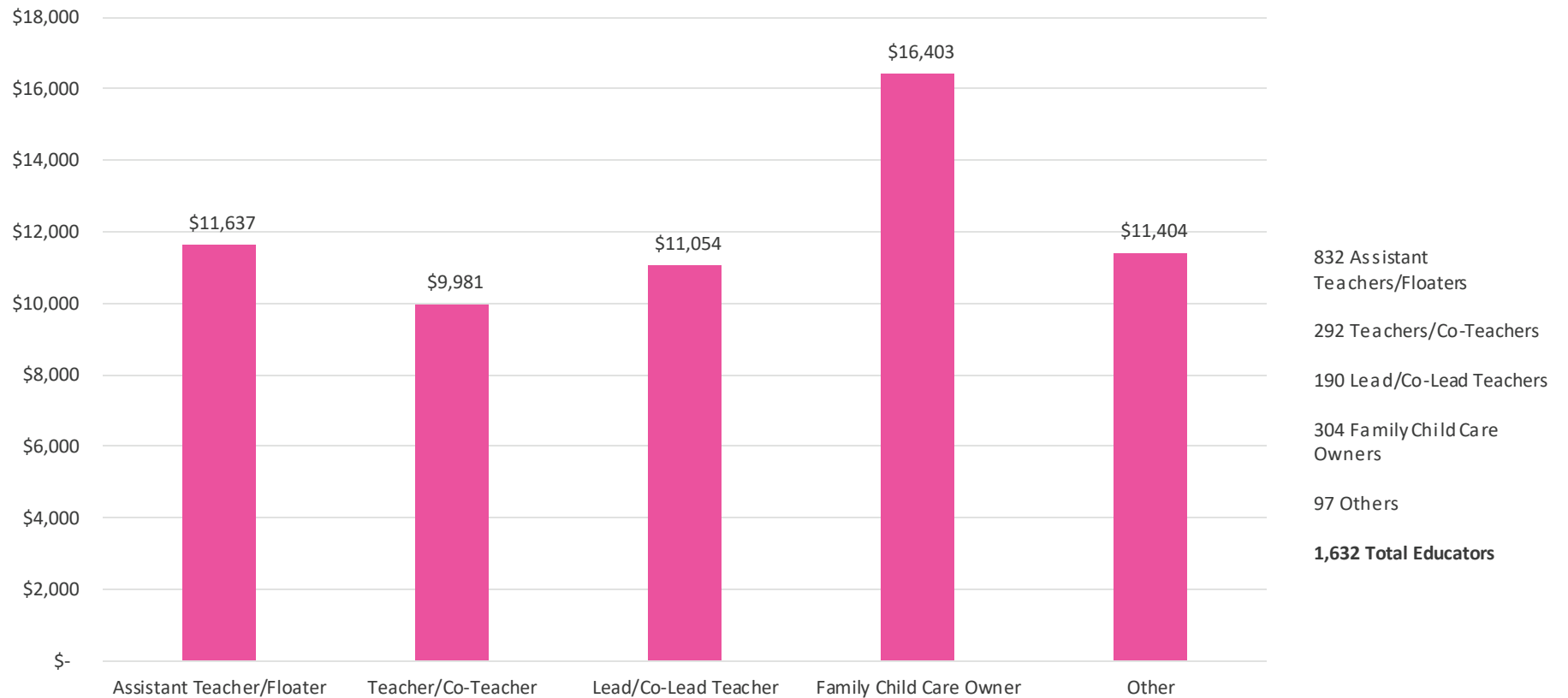

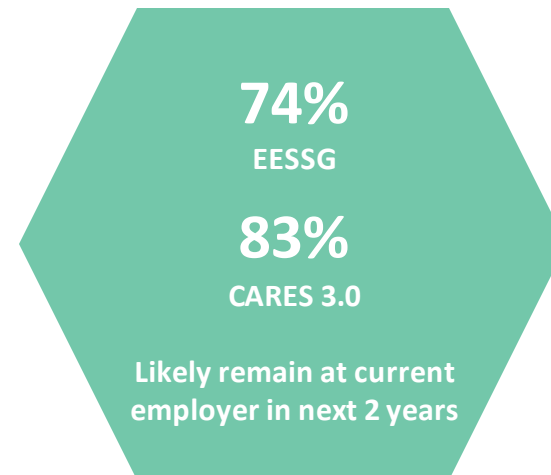
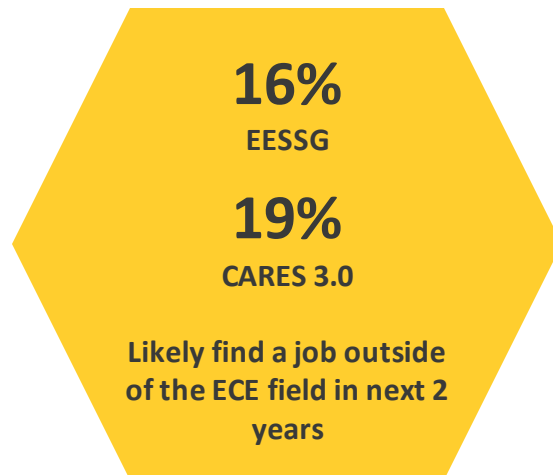
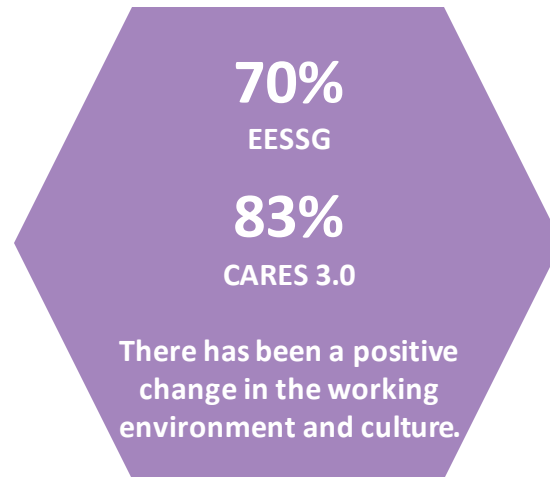


CARES 3.0 stipends also substantially raised early educator compensation

Average CARES 3.0 Stipend Awards (Annualized)

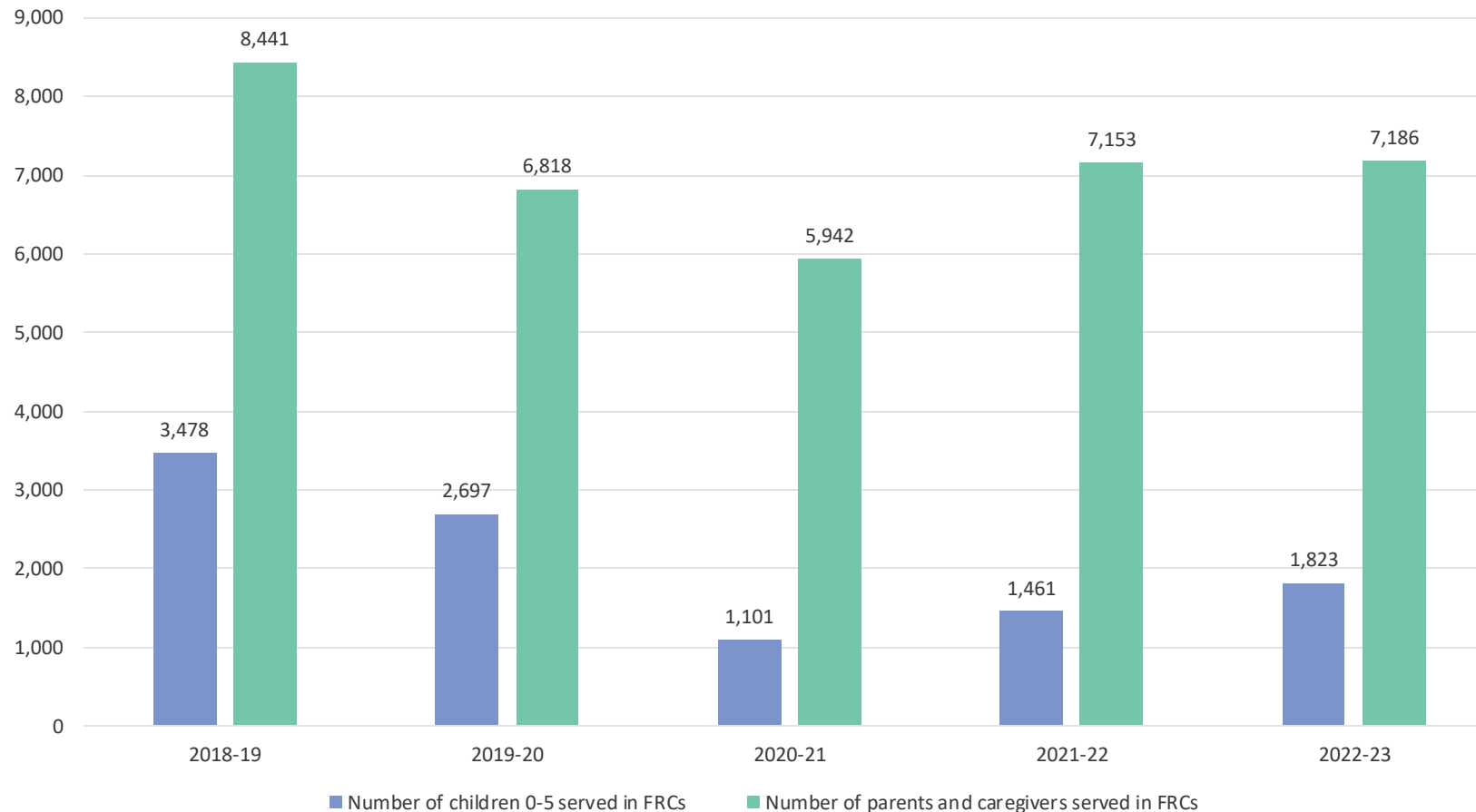

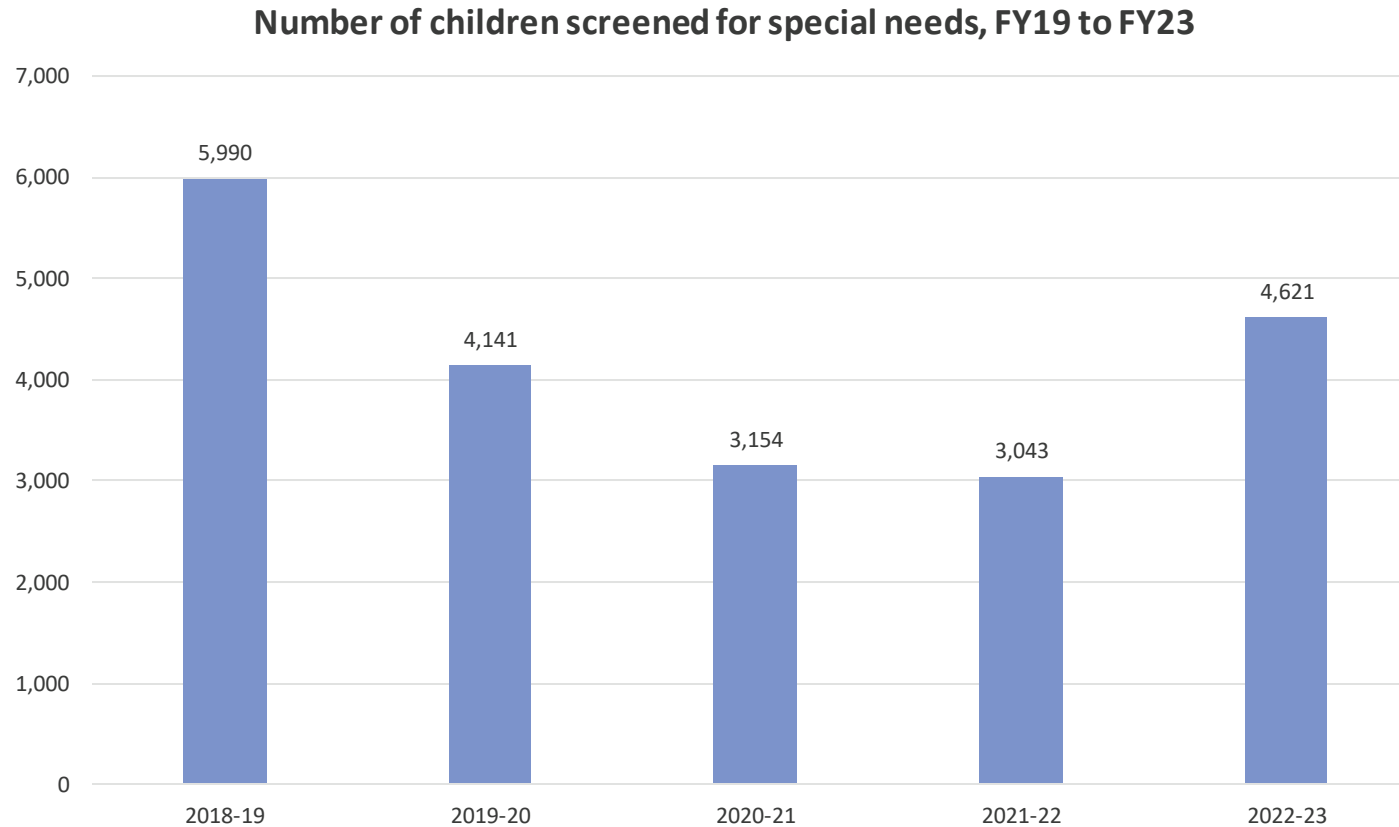

In summary...

- ECE enrollment is still recovering, but it will look different in the future with promising growth in infant and toddler care, expansion in middle-class eligibility, and continued TK ramp-up.
- DEC sustained the supply of ECE programs through the pandemic and continues to expand ECE options for families through network growth and facilities investments.
- Early educator compensation grew dramatically in City-funded programs, contributing to lower turnover and higher morale.
- FRC and developmental screening initiatives are recovering on parallel paths with ECE and affected by the same overall population trends.
- Data presented are primarily outputs, and DEC is moving toward creating better systems for measurement of outcomes and impact.

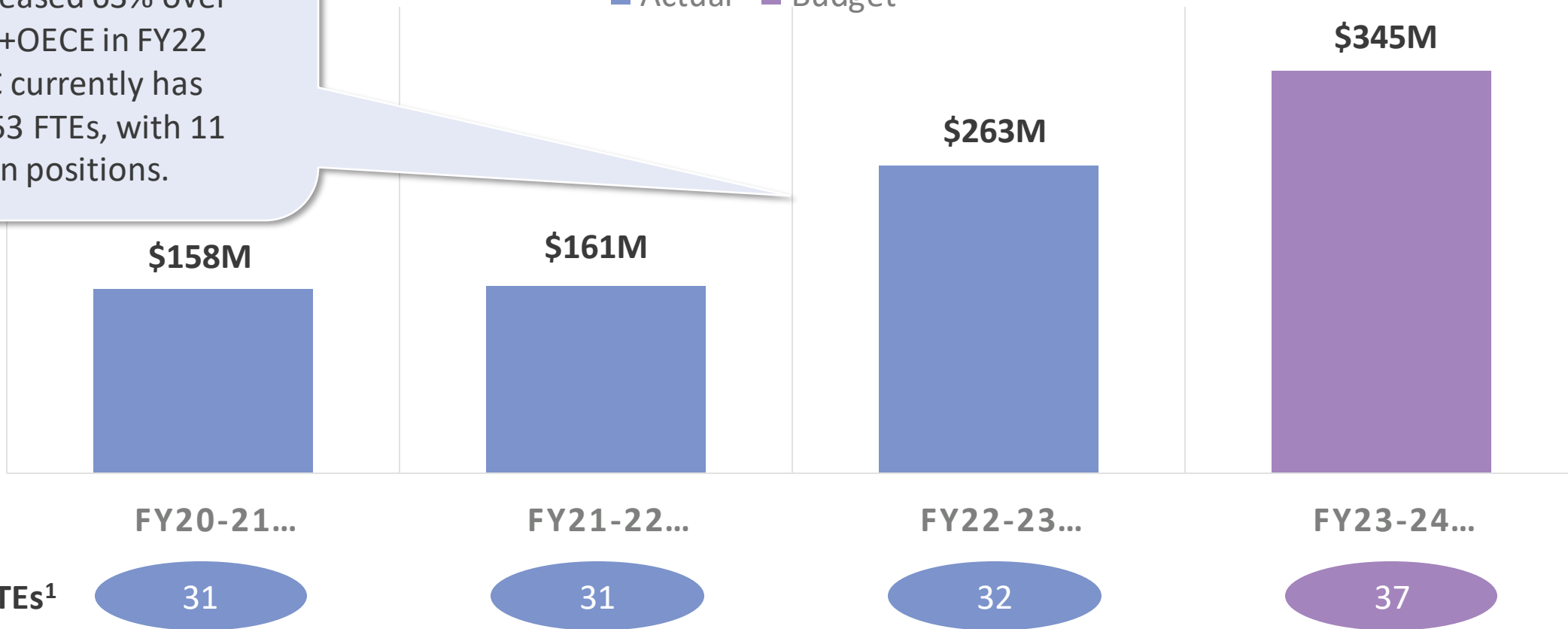

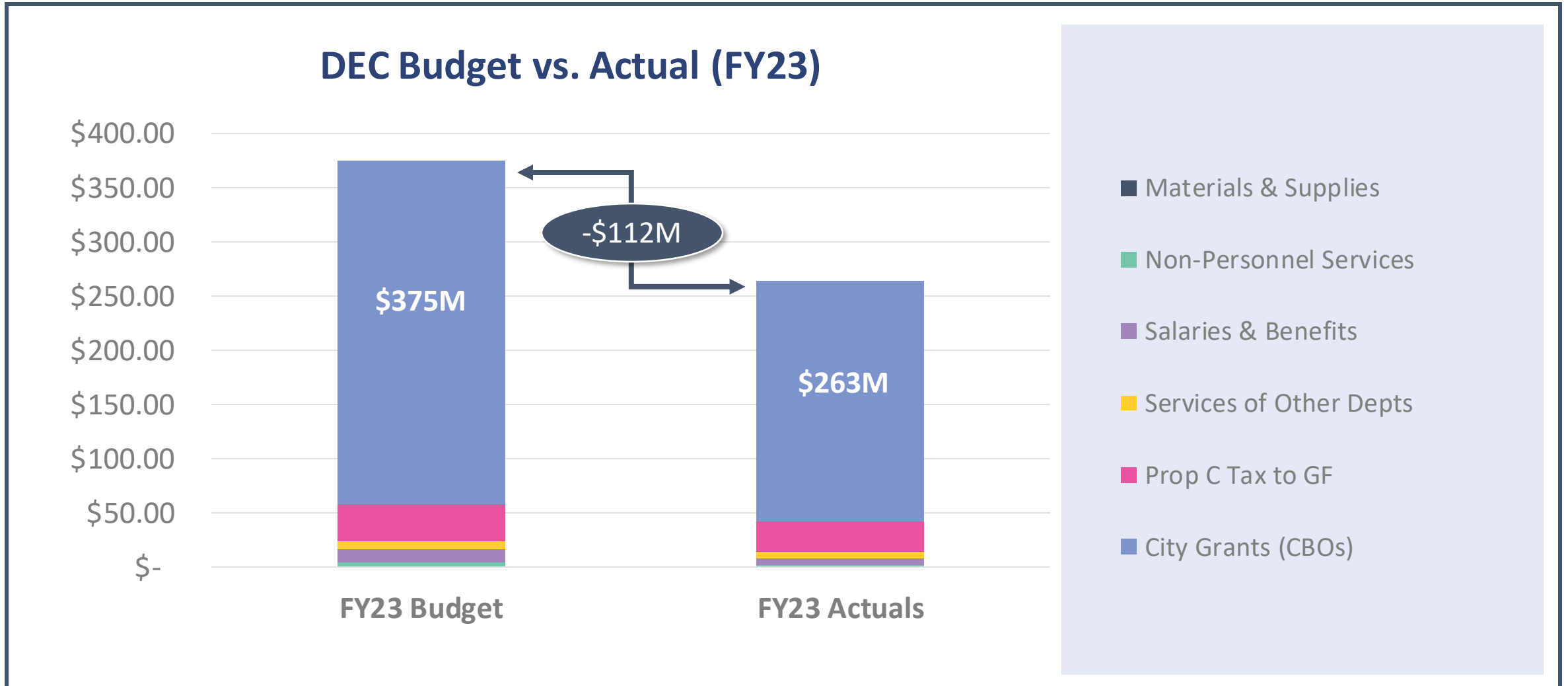

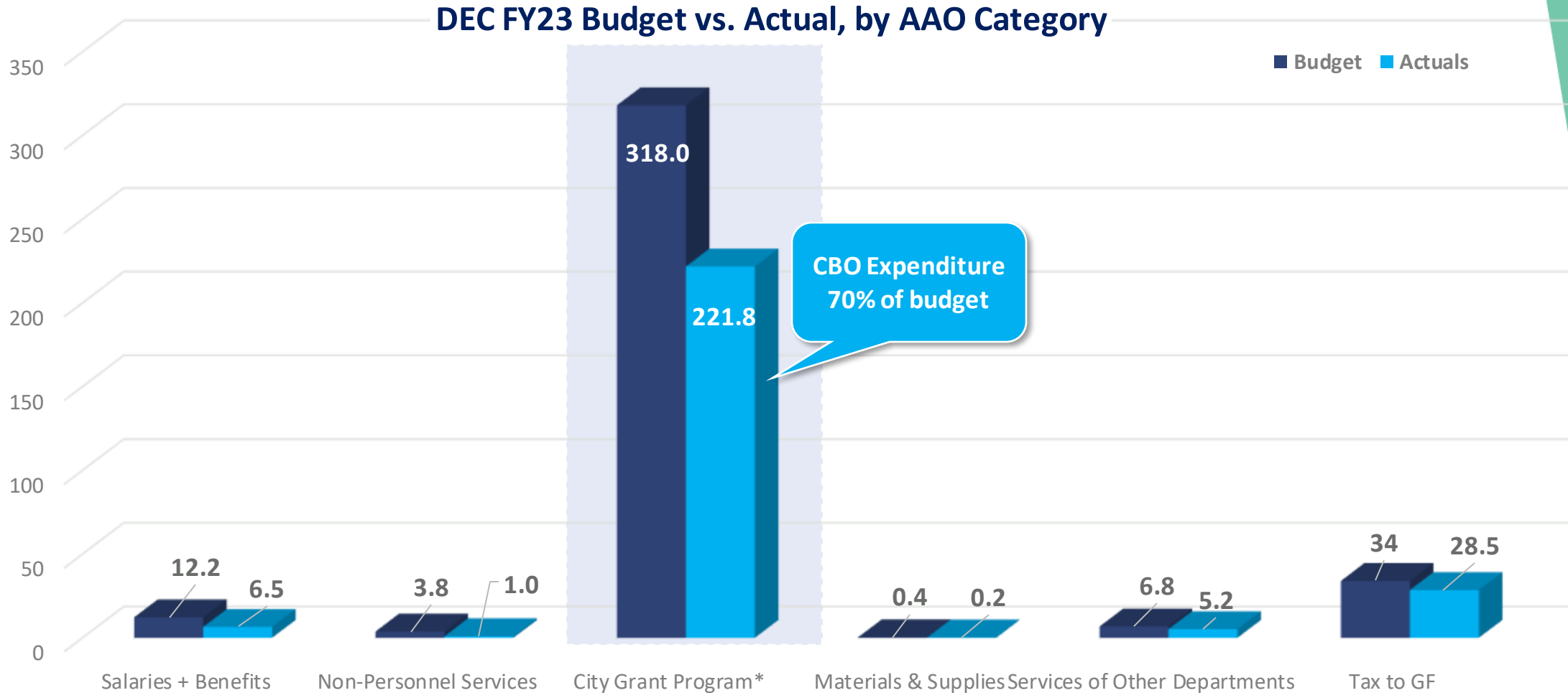

FY23 Budget surplus driven by grants to CBOs

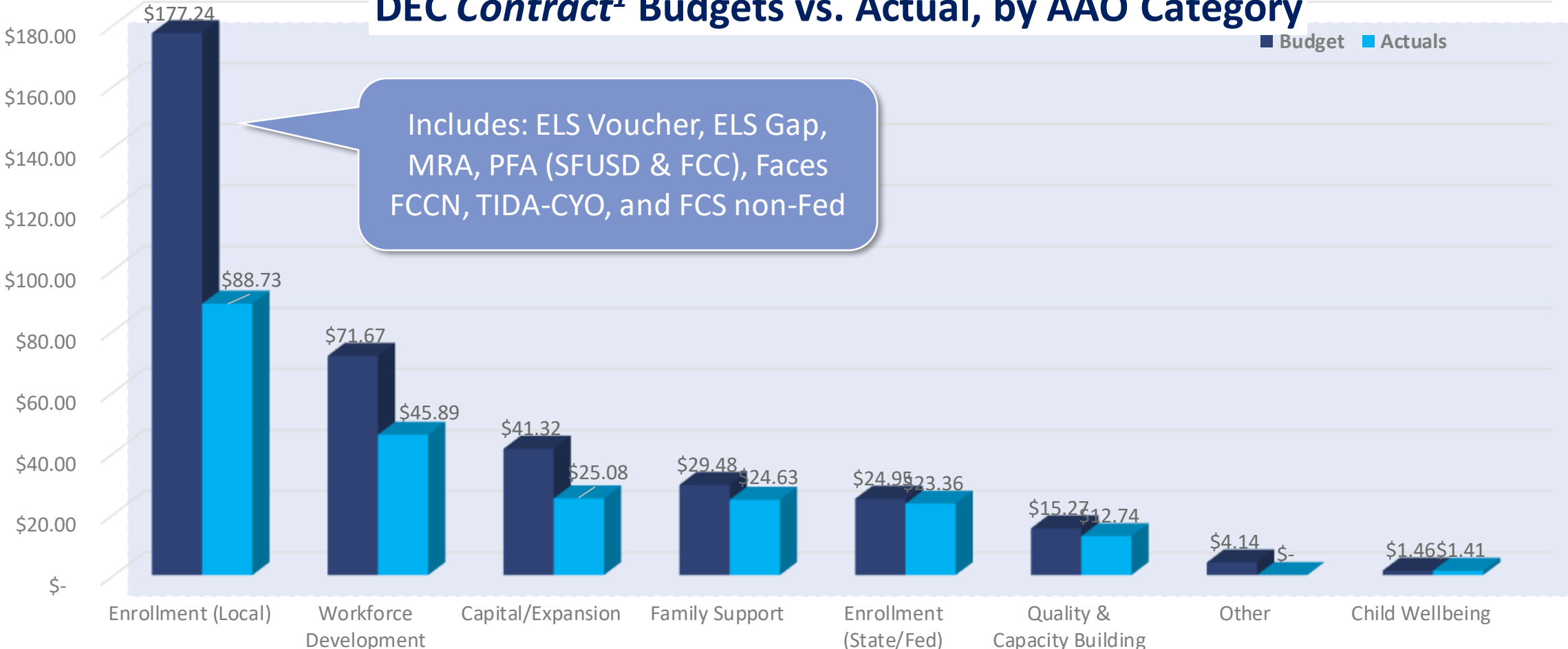

In Summary...

- In FY23, The Department of Early Childhood (DEC) expended \$263M on a budget of \$375M, this represents a 63% year on year increase over the \$161M in combined expenditures of First 5 (CFC) and the Office of Early Care and Education (OECE) in FY22.
- For DEC to expand enrollment, workforce compensation and facilities investments must keep pace; enhancements to wraparound supports will also be required to ensure program quality and child wellbeing supportive of kindergarten readiness.
- Prop C is currently stable; however, major risks are still unknown (i.e., policy changes and timing for expiration of the long-term leases of major commercial lease holders).
- Continued expenditure growth expected in FY24 as department staffing grows and new Prop C programs reach a steadier state (e.g., enrollment is on trend to increase \$13.7M in FY24).
