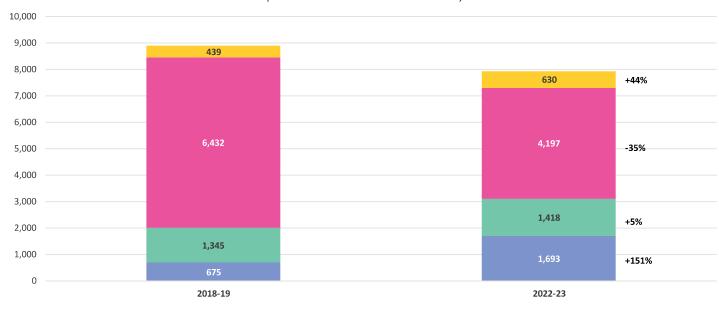

Enrollment in ELS and TK, 2018-19 vs. 2022-23 (DEC and SFUSD administrative data)

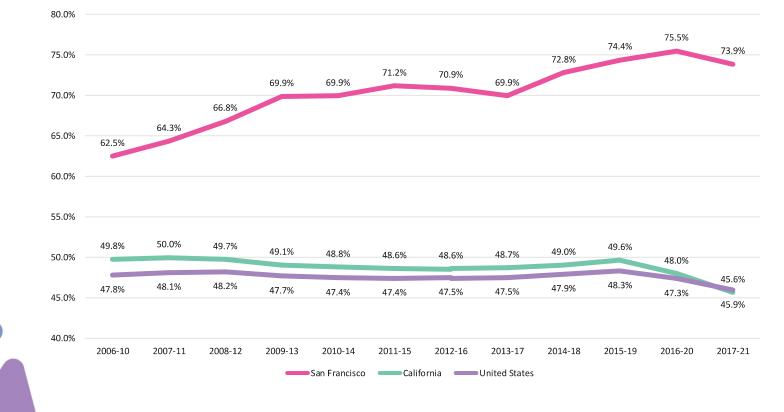

San Francisco leads the nation in preschool enrollment

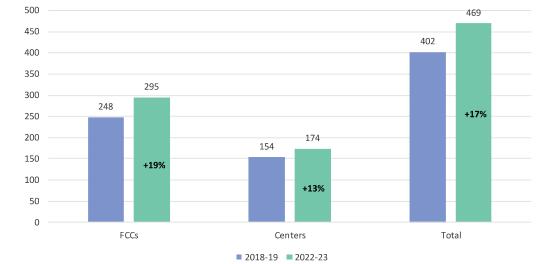
Proportion of 3- and 4-Year-Olds Enrolled in School, 2006-10 to 2017-21

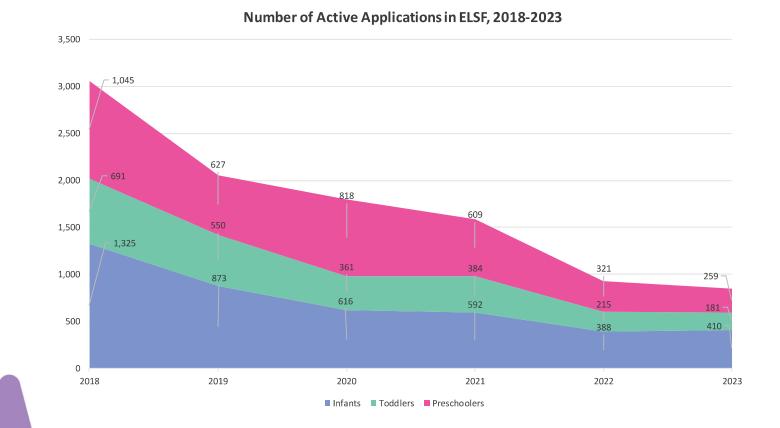

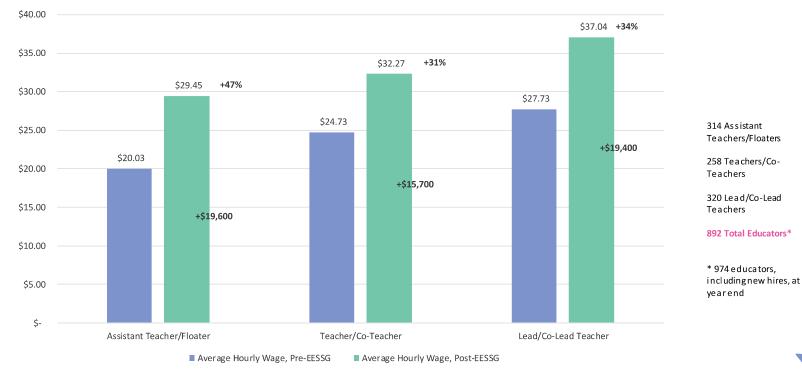

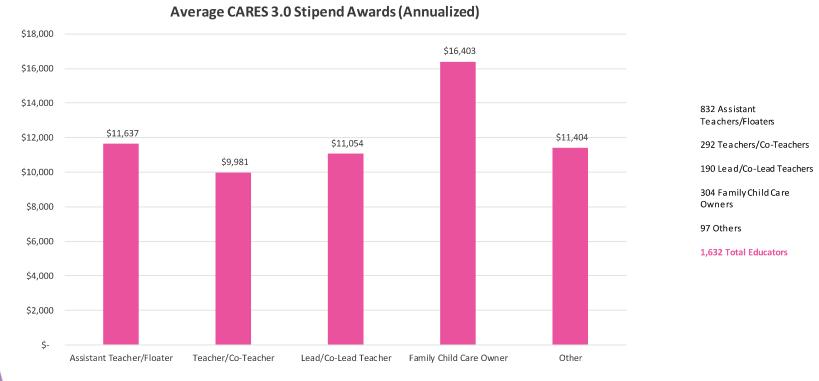


DEC boosted early educator wages for teachers serving highest need students

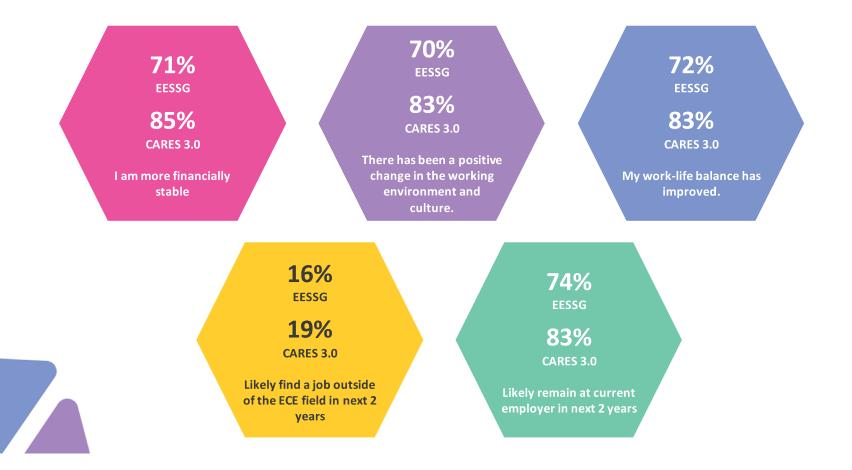


Impact of EESSG on ECE Teacher Wages

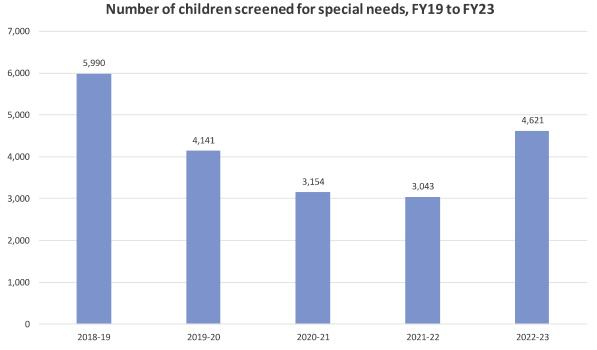
CARES 3.0 stipends also substantially raised early educator compensation



Compensation initiatives have stabilized the workforce, improved conditions for educators

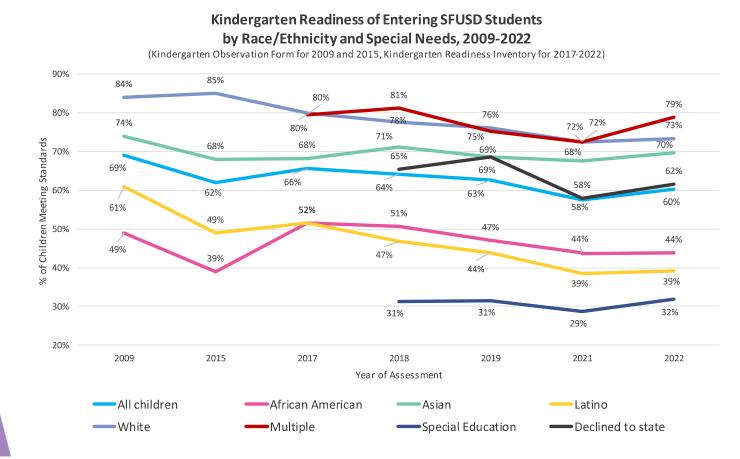

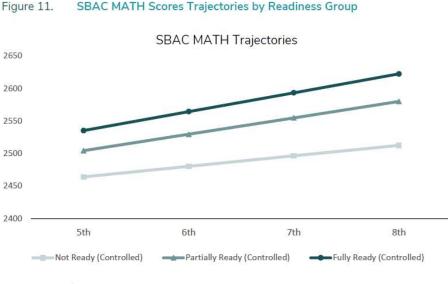
Race and special needs are strong predictors of readiness

DEC Budget Priorities Building a Strong Foundation

- San Francisco faces longstanding racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic disparities in kindergarten readiness despite its universally accessible preschool system.
- Prenatal to age three is a rapid and sensitive development period, setting the foundation for long-term health and well-being.
- DEC policies and funding will focus on the well-being of our infants and toddlers to ensure a healthy start, while continuing to invest in a high-quality universal ECE system from birth to five.
- Ongoing development of San Francisco's ECE System will foster the nurturing environments infants and toddlers need to reduce these longstanding disparities in access and outcomes.
- Track our impact on improving the well-being of children and families.

DEC Budget Priorities Solid Start: Access, Workforce, Infrastructure



Continue DEC's historic and first-of-its-kind investment in ECE Workforce Compensation (CARES 3.0 & EESSG)



Preserve access through local Early Learning Subsidies for low-middle class families up to 110% AMI



Fund improvements, maintenance, and new construction of early learning family childcare homes and centers



Maintain investment in Family Resource Centers (entering a new funding cycle)

DEC Budget Priorities Narrowing the K-Readiness Gap



Infant & Toddler Wellbeing

High-quality, culturally and linguistically responsive infant & toddler early care and education ("ECE") is accessible and affordable.



Workforce Quality & Capacity

San Francisco early educators serving the most vulnerable children are highly educated and fairly paid with a workforce that reflects the community.



Inclusion

Developmental delays and learning differences are identified early, and families are supported in accessing identified interventions in a timely way.

Connecting resources and systems so that caregivers feel informed, engaged, and empowered to support their young children through the most formative years



DEC Budget Priorities (1/3) Infant & Toddler Wellbeing

Key Objectives and Initiatives

- Childcare Spaces: Assist providers to transition capacity from PreK to infant/toddler, expand licensed capacity and improve existing spaces
- Workforce: Increase the number of ECE professionals with expertise in the earliest years
- Expertise: Provide training & technical assistance to providers and optimize teacher support for infants & toddlers.



DEC Budget Priorities (2/3) Workforce Quality & Capacity

Workforce Quality & Capacity

- Workforce Compensation: Transform provider pay, ensuring pay and parity.
- Pathways and Recruitment: Build and retain a diverse workforce, including supporting multi-lingual learners.
- Permits: Child Development Teacher permit support and tuition reimbursement to access higher education (focusing on core ECE units and infant/toddler development).



DEC Budget Priorities (3/3)

Inclusion

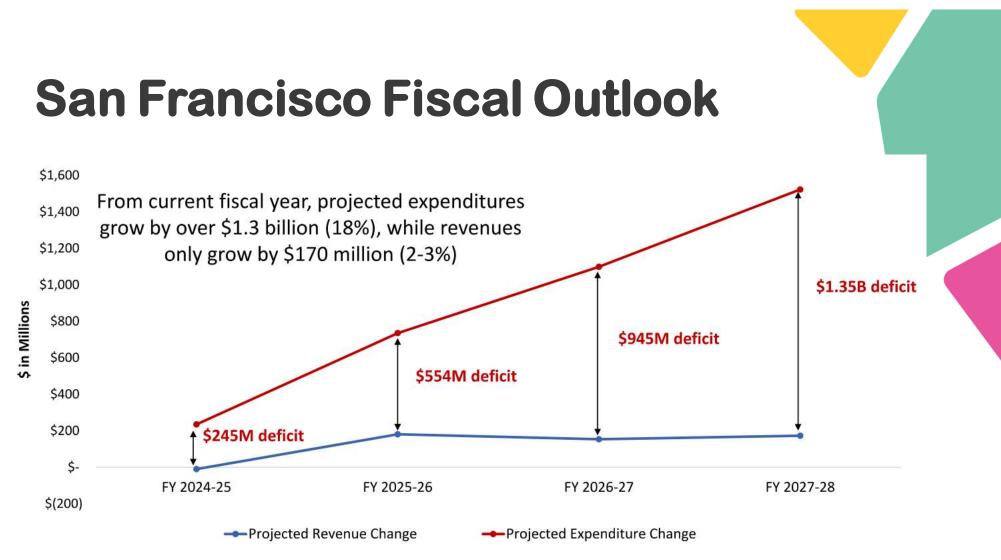
- Early Intervention and Specialized Services System: Expand an integrated early intervention system of care that offers family support and resources for developmental concerns and identified disabilities, establishes a centralized access point for service linkage, and creates long-term care coordination teams for children at highest risk
- Screening: Enhance developmental screening capacity up to 5,000 children
- Systems of Support: Leverage DEC position to influence systems of care at the local, state, and national level

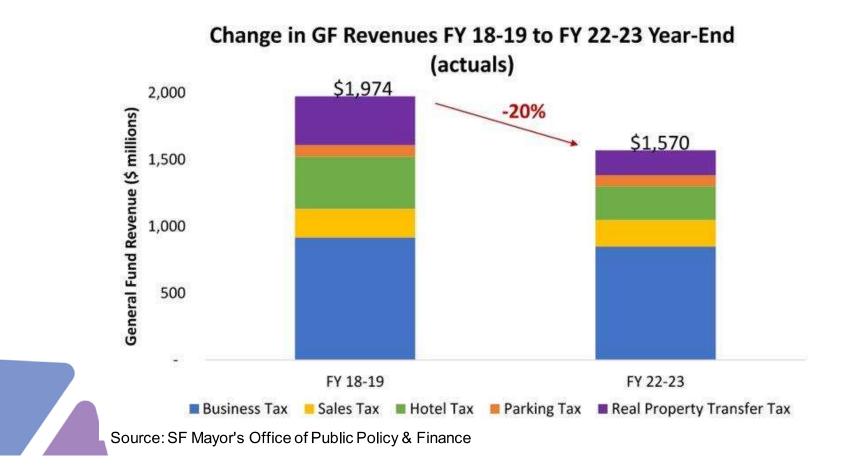
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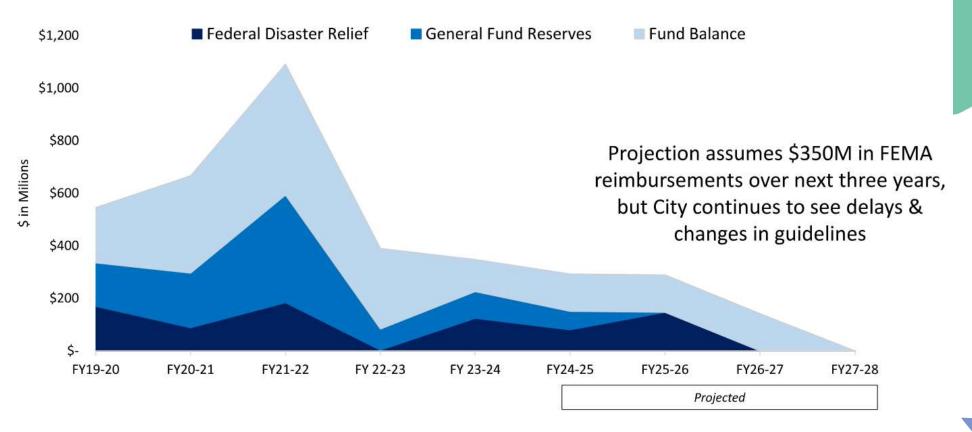

General Fund Revenues Limited





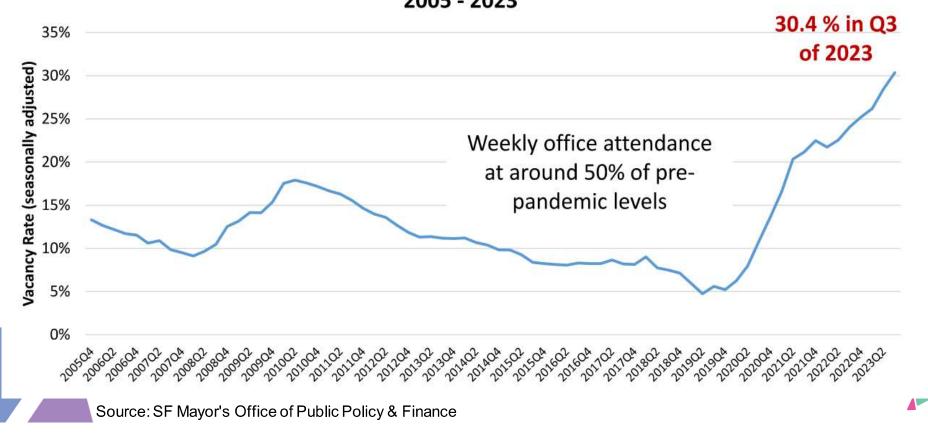

Key Expenditures Rising

- Salaries and benefits: Increase by nearly \$500 million over plan period.
- Required baselines: Grow by around \$200 million & include newest Student Success Fund, which grows to \$35 million in FY 2024-25 and \$60 million by FY 2027-28.
- **Citywide operating costs:** Real estate, capital, debt payments, PUC rates, and implementation of multiyear inflation on all GF nonprofit grants.
- Other major costs: shelter costs due to expiring state grants, commitments to subsidizing housing for formerly homeless (LOSP), IHSS program growth.

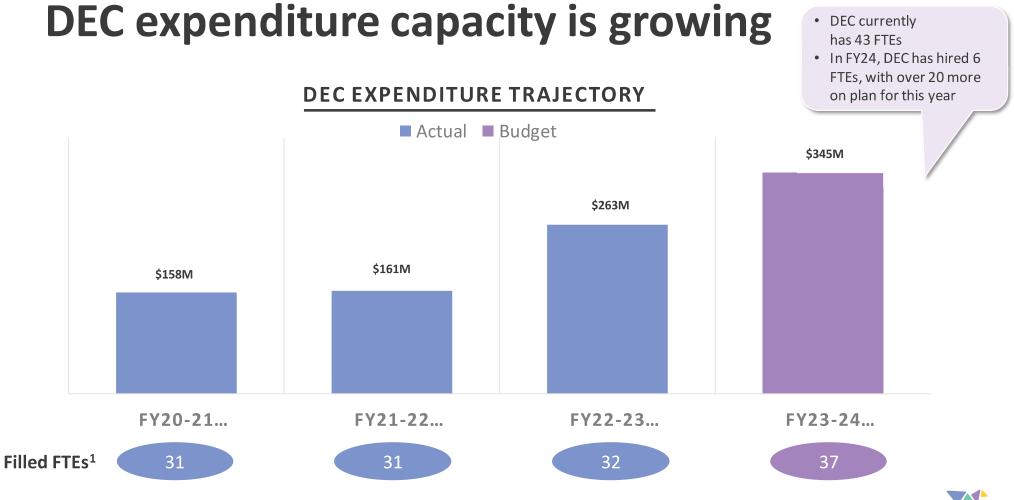
Mayor's Priorities

- Improving public safety and street conditions
- Citywide economic vitality
- Reducing homelessness and transforming mental health service delivery
- Accountability and equity in services and spending

Mayor's Budget Instructions

- General Fund departments requested to make 10% cuts in FY24-25 and 10% cuts in FY25-26 with an additional 5% contingency identified.
- No new FTEs (also discouraged for non-GF departments rigorous justification required for consideration); Departments asked to hold nonessential vacancies for savings
- Impact to DEC yet to be determined:
 - MBO/DEC evaluating required GF support as it relates to Children's Baseline
 - \$1.38M cut currently loaded in BFM for BY and BY+1 *Cuts not reflected in subsequent slides
 - Work Order budgets likely to evolve, pending decisions by other Departments

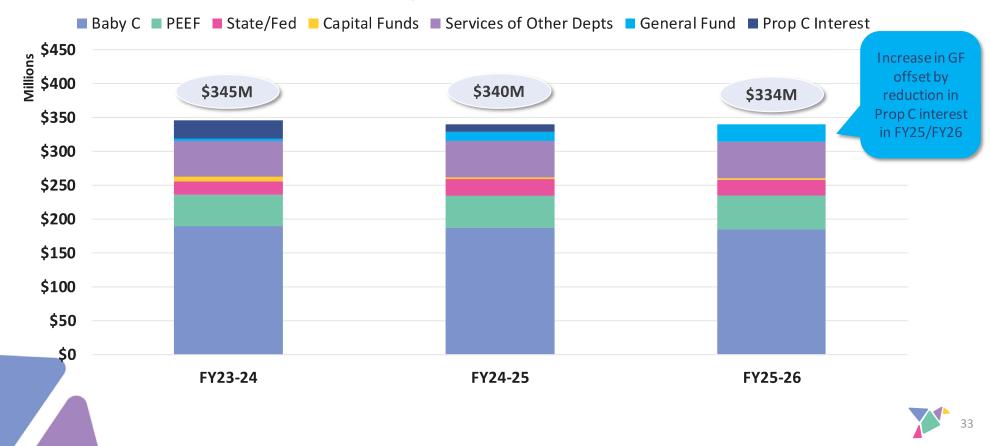

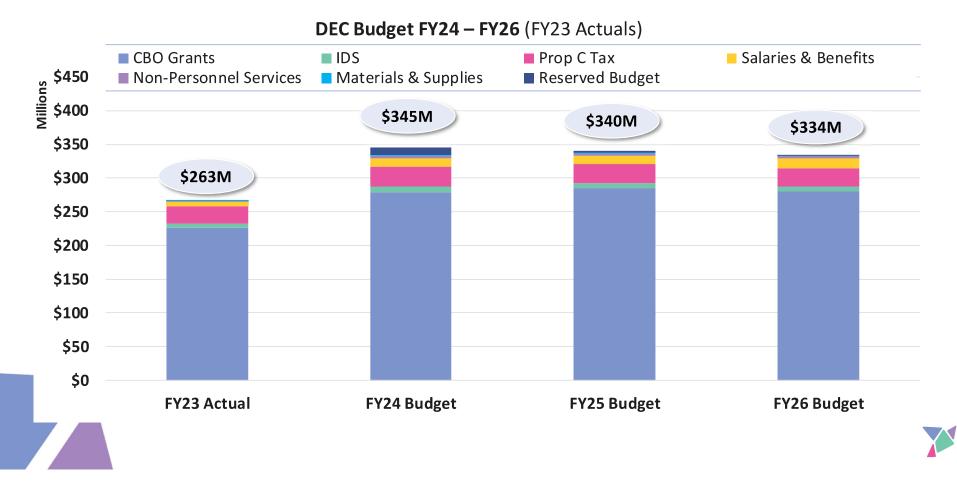

DEC Budget - Expenditures



Key Programmatic Investments

- 1. Early Learning Subsidies/Enrollment (\$165.0M) Support for universal free/affordable childcare and education in San Francisco
- 2. Workforce Development (\$71.0M) Compensation enhancement, recruiting & retention, diversity, and professional development
- 3. Childcare Facilities (\$30.8M) Funding new ECE sites and capacity expansion, improvements, and site maintenance
- 4. Family Support (\$21.5M) Parent education and support
- 5. Child Wellbeing (\$11.8M) Universal screening, child health/wellness and classroom support for child wellbeing
